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


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
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Badsey Film Club

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

Hopefully with warmer weather the conditions for the back garden, astronomy will be improving. However, the sun sets about two minutes later each evening and with the clocks changing at the end of March the evenings are noticeably drawing out. April is therefore the ideal time to search out this month's Stargazing objects.

There are two fascinating objects to look out for this month - they are a little difficult to locate, but are well worth the effort. First, find The Plough which is known to astronomers as Ursa Major. The end two stars in The Plough, Merak and Dubhe, are also known as the Pointers as they point towards the Pole Star. If you follow this line towards the Pole Star, about halfway along and 10 degrees to the right, you will find two grey fuzzy patches. Unfortunately, they are just a little too faint to be seen with the naked eye, but you should be able to find them with a good pair of binoculars or a small telescope.

The first of our two objects is known by its catalogue number of M81, and is named Bode's Galaxy after its discoverer - the German Astronomer Johann Elert Bode. Bode first discovered this wonderful spiral galaxy on 31st December 1774. Close by in the sky is our second object for this month, another galaxy known as M82 or the Cigar Galaxy, because of its strange shape. What we are seeing in this second galaxy is one that is edge on to us, but its shape has also





been distorted and there are regions of new star formation. These two galaxies are about 12 million light years away, and as such are relatively close to the Milky Way galaxy. For reference our closest neighbouring galaxy is Andromeda, which is about 2.5 million light years from Earth.

The reason the Cigar Galaxy is distorted is that these two galaxies are gravitationally bound together and are orbiting each other every 100 million years. Current measurements suggest that the two galaxies passed close to each other about 600 million years ago when they had a near collision. Since then, they have been orbiting each other and are stripping dust and hydrogen gas from each other into intergalactic space and causing new stars to form in the outer regions of both galaxies. This is especially visible in the shape of the Cigar Galaxy, and the red coloured filaments that can be seen in photographs.

It is expected that these two galaxies will orbit each other for a while and then finally merge in a few billion years. There is an enormous amount of space between the stars that make up a galaxy, and it is not expected that stars will actually collide, but the merger will be a blend of the two systems. At first, the shape of the combined galaxy will appear chaotic. The supermassive black holes at the centres of each galaxy will eventually orbit each other before merging themselves, and after a few more billion years the shape of the combined galaxy will settle down to form a new, much large spiral galaxy.

April is the best time of year to see these two wonderful objects, so why not take a little time on a clear evening to hunt them out with a pair of binoculars or telescope and enjoy the spectacle of these two fantastic objects in our night sky.



Jane Neill's Nature Notes...



April is a time of renewal with lambs gamboling in the fields and trees bursting with fresh green leaves.

One of our prettiest wild flowers, the white dead nettle, appear along footpaths and roadsides. Once known as Adam-and-Eve-in-the-bower for when the flower is held upside down, the black and golden stamens lie side by side like two figures on a satin bed. Bees, butterflies and insects become more active as the sun climbs higher. Watch the skies for the first swallows, martins and swifts, and check hedges before you cut them as birds are busy nesting.







Birds like the greenfinch that declined due to trichomonosis, a parasite induced disease that prevents feeding, are thankfully recovering their numbers with helpful advice about keeping our feeders regularly cleaned. This olive green bird with yellow patches on the wings is often spotted at the top of tall trees announcing its presence with a drawn

out "dzweee". The stonechat, related to the robin and named by its call sounding like two stones hitting together, was my unexpected encounter in the meadow! In the brook, I was thrilled to see a pair of goosanders, the largest of the sawbill ducks. Their serrated bills make catching slippery fish easier. **Keep watching. You never know!**

1. How long have you been on the Parish Council? About seven years now.

2. What post on the Parish Council do you hold? I represent the Badsey Ward.

3. What sub-committees are you on?

I am on the Events committee; I think it is so important in a community that people have the opportunity to come out and join together in village events. I am also on the Land committee and had a small part in the Pear Tree Fields project which I still find exciting.

Currently, I am trying to raise funds for an observatory at Pear Tree Fields which will provide a meeting place for local

astronomers and a resource to introduce local young people to the wonders of the sky.

Not a subcommittee as such, but I also help with the Computer Group that meets on alternate Mondays to encourage people to become more computer savvy."

4. What's your favourite village event?

I think my favourite event has got to be the Christmas event. It has changed over the years and evolved into something that is quite magical. With the link to the carols organised by the Badsey Society that followed this year's event, it made for a particularly wonderful start to Christmas."

5. How long have you lived in the parish of Badsey & Aldington?

I moved with my job to Badsey in 1983 and expected to only stay for a few years. However, when children arrived we settled into village life. As my job became more interesting we decided to stay. Now, after 41 years, I can't see us moving anywhere.

6. Where were you born?

I was born and brought up in Southampton, and I moved away at the age of 18 when I went to university. My first job then took me to Cardiff where I lived for five years, before moving to the Vale of Evesham.

7. What's your favourite meal?

I find this an especially difficult question, as I like French and Italian food as well as Indian and Chinese. I think that the one ingredient that really makes a good meal is the company you are with. If there is nothing on a menu that I fancy, I can always fall back on the standard medium-rare steak with homemade, once-cooked chips and definitely no green vegetables!"

8. What's your favourite holiday destination?

Since Covid we have been taking our holidays in and around the UK. This has taken us to so many fabulous places over the past few years, such as the Northumberland coast, Hadrian's Wall, Suffolk and Norfolk. This year we are off to Canterbury and Kent."

9. How would you describe your music taste?
