March winds and April showers, bring forth May flowers

This magazine gets delivered to you in May, but is printed a couple of weeks before – which means that all contributions have to be written before that. So I am writing this just after Easter.

We returned from a holiday in Spain a couple of days ago, so my head is still full of the amazing places we saw, the delicious food we ate, the sounds of the language, and the sights that we saw as we travelled on the trains, in the restaurants, and the different attractions we visited - I even recall the conversations that we had throughout the week. Despite some weeks of regular practice on Duolingo beforehand, my Spanish could not exactly be described as fluent, but I enjoyed reading menus and street signs and anything else that I saw on the way. One of the things I noticed was the instruction esperar, which anyone who has learned a Romance language will know means both "wait" and "hope". In English, we use completely different words for these two things. But, of course, we can see that "waiting" and "hoping" are related once you stop to think about it – because why would you bother waiting for something if you didn't have hope that it was actually going to happen?

We have been waiting and hoping for spring, waiting and hoping for warmer and drier weather, and waiting and hoping for longer and lighter days all through the winter. All through the 40 days of Lent, and especially in the days from Good Friday until the Sunday morning, the Church waited for Easter and the good news of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. We waited - not in despair - but in hope and expectation. What are the things that you hope for? Is there some change or shift in your own circumstances (or in someone else's life that you are waiting for) that you hope will happen? So often, waiting and hoping is all that gets us through bad patches. Jesus talked quite often to his friends about the importance of waiting in hope and expectation for God to act – "Look for the Kingdom of God which is closer than your own hand" – but the Bible also makes it clear that it is also up to us to take action, in hope, that God is here and is involved with our lives.

We have to jump in and help be the change that we want to see to make the world a kinder, better place - that is one way of loving our neighbour as we love ourselves. But we don't do that work by ourselves; instead, we can reach out and help each other in the knowledge and in the hope that God IS here, is present among us and continues to call us into a knowledge of His love for each of us, day after day, week after week, throughout all the seasons of our years.

In times of trouble, the community comes together

As seen by now in both Badsey and the local news, April saw three families from The Lankets suffer a terrible loss after a tragic fire broke out in one of their homes, spreading to two more in the process. We are thankful that no one was hurt, but it took the courage of multiple fire crews to tackle the blaze which left a large amount of damage in its wake. Due to the vast amount of coverage this story has already received, we are not looking to discuss the fire in detail and would like to give the affected families space to continue navigating this difficult time. Instead, we would like to use the Community News in the way it is intended: to highlight the kindness and generosity of the community that we are so proud to be a part of. It was truly wonderful to see how those in and around Badsey came together to support those affected in their time of need. From local businesses providing shelter, funds and a place for donations to be left, to the thousands of pounds in donations generously given by friends, family members and residents, we just wanted to use our newsletter to highlight that even in the darkest of times, hope and light can always be found in those who surround us.

Could you help provide the community with a route to the stars?

In September 2022, a resident suggested to the Parish Council that Pear Tree Fields would be an ideal site for residents of the village to observe the night sky. An exciting project was then proposed to build an observatory for the village, with a permanently placed telescope in a dome that can be used by all those interested, with the aim of supporting the introduction of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) to young people in a practical environment, as well as people already interested in astronomy as a hobby. This would include youth groups as well as young people in formal education.

An informal meeting was then held to find out the level of interest, attended by several amateur astronomers to discuss the feasibility of such a project, and it was agreed that there was enough support to go ahead. Since then, quietly in the background, plans have been drawn up, estimates of work have been gained and youth organisations have been approached to gain an understanding of their level of interest, and presentations have been made to county councillors. Most importantly of all, though, planning

permission has been gained for the structures that will be required.

We are now moving into the later phase of the planning of this project: deciding what purpose we want the observatory to serve, and securing the funding required. We now need people who would be willing to help bring these ideas and concepts together, and realise this thrilling project in practical form. No special skills or knowledge is required - just an enthusiasm to help influence the direction that the project can take.

Jane Neill's Nature Notes...

"March winds and April showers, bring forth May flowers", as the saying goes. The hedges are full of hawthorn blossom, named mayflowers, along with honeysuckle in full bloom. Comfrey stands tall along the brook with its clusters of pink a purplish drooping flowers and hairyleaves. Also named knitbone, bruisewort or boneset, telling the long time medicinal use of this herb. Its juice promotes the growth of connective tissue and bone.

The first damselflies emerge. The orange tip is a special spring addition to the variety of butterflies. It lays its eggs on the underside of leaves, or sometimes flowers, and feeds mainly on ladies smock (cuckoo flower). Only the male has orange tips whereas the female is plain white.

Traditionally, sheep are sheared in May. Birds are enchantingly vocal; May is the dawn chorus month. I love to hear the blackbirds chattering away so tunefully while the thrush has perfected its repertoire of phrases. The last of the migrants have also arrived, including the swift. If we are very lucky, we might hear the cuckoo sing its heart out (I have a recording of such a moment).

Lastly, we are being advised to be kind to slugs and snails. Now there's a dilemma for gardeners!


Virgo, Andromeda and the Mindboggling Cosmos

By now you cannot have helped but notice that the evenings are drawing out nicely, and on clear evenings later in the month, the sky to the north never gets fully dark. Therefore, this month's object is in the southern sky during the early evening, and has a story behind it that goes a little way towards showing just how large the cosmos really is.

As Douglas Adams said in his novel The Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy: "Space is big, really big. You just won't believe how vastly, hugely, mindbogglingly big it is."

The constellation of Virgo is due south towards and above the horizon at about 10pm during May. The brightest star in the constellation is called Spica and is relatively easy to spot, being one of the 20 brightest stars in the night sky. Spica is a blue giant star that is nearly twelve times as massive as the Sun and is about 250 light years away.



Within the area of the Virgo constellation, there are a large number of galaxies. Some can be seen with a small telescope, and even more can be seen with much larger professional instruments. These galaxies that are far beyond our own Milky Way are known as the Virgo cluster. Our galaxy, along with the Andromeda galaxy (our neighbour) and other galaxies such as M81 and M82 that were mentioned last month, are all moving in the direction of the Virgo cluster. In that direction, there are even more galaxies, and together with our local group of galaxies, we are part of a super cluster of galaxies.

Within the structure of our cosmos, matter isn't evenly spread but forms in clumps. These clumps form stars and planets and the stars and planets form galaxies. These galaxies then form clusters and filaments and super clusters. At present, we know of about 10 million of these known super clusters.

Our Milky Way is moving towards a point close to the Virgo Cluster, and the entire Virgo Super Cluster appears to be moving towards a point much further away. It has therefore been suggested that there is something gravitationally attracting all of these galaxies, and this has been given the name of The Great Attractor. However, it has also been suggested that the Great Attractor may not actually exist, and what is being measured is the natural motion of the galaxies like twigs in a river in a giant game of Poohsticks.

At the current velocity of the Milky Way, it is calculated that it will reach the other galaxies in the Virgo Cluster in about a trillion years, a staggeringly large amount of time. It is also the amount of time that it has been calculated that there will be no more hydrogen left in open space to form stars, and the age of light will come to an end.

However, the Milky Way will not reach the Super Cluster, because something else strange is happening to space itself: empty space appears to be expanding.

The empty expanse of nothing appears to be not fully empty and it is expanding, and this is pushing galaxies apart. We do not currently understand what is causing this expansion and scientists call it Dark Energy. At the current rate of expansion, the space between us and the Virgo Cluster will eventually be greater than the speed of light. Nothing can travel faster than the speed of light, but the accumulative expansion of small increments of space will make it appear that the Virgo Cluster is receding at this velocity and at that point it will disappear from view. This will not be for several billion years.

So, why not spend a little time to find the Virgo constellation and take a few moments to wonder about just how big and how weird the universe really is?
